

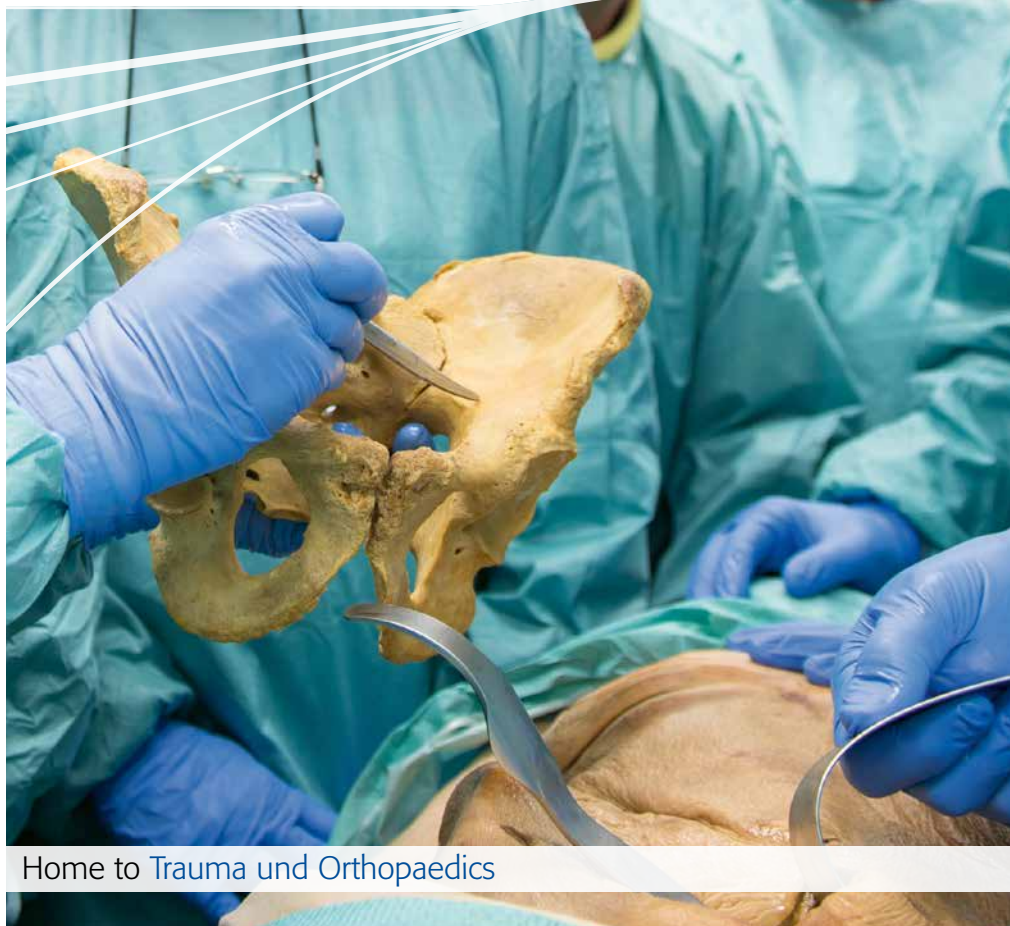

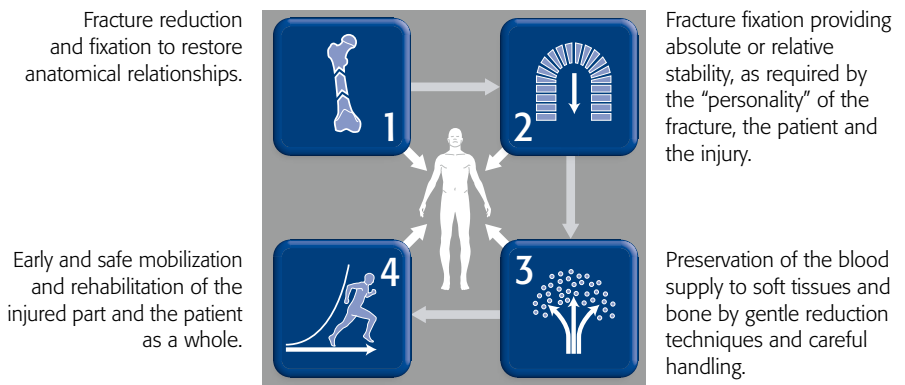

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Goal of the course

The goal of the course is to broaden the knowledge and comprehension of operative fracture treatment according to the level of education or specialty and to practice surgical approaches.

Target participants

The AOTrauma Course Acetabular & Pelvic Fracture Management is targeted at experienced, certified orthopaedic and trauma surgeons with advanced knowledge and skills in operative fracture treatment who wish to broaden their knowledge in this specific field and who wish to practice surgical approaches for a better comprehension.

Learning objectives

Upon completion of the course, the participant should be able to:

- make decisions as to the optimal treatment modality according to the AO Principles
- have learned about the latest developments in research and clinical investigation
- be acquainted with new techniques and technologies as well as alternative approaches in fracture treatment
- have improved the manual skills by practicing on different bone models and human specimens
- to understand the evolution of AO Philosophy and Education – what is new and what is still valid as well as the rationale behind any changes

Course description

The topics for the AOTrauma Course Acetabular & Pelvic Fracture Management will cover classification and principles of treatment in pelvic and acetabular fracture management as well as different techniques, surgical anatomy & approaches. They will be taught in short lectures and videos followed by practical exercises on artificial bones, muscles specimens and anatomical specimens. During the exercises key steps are projected on the monitors. Each work station is limited to two participants.
